TEA TASTING TIP

Slow things down and focus on the character of your tea - the aroma of the dry leaf, the spent leaf, and the tea liquor - up close and afar. When tasting the tea liquor, oxygenating it by slurping will add more flavour. Concentrate on the transitioning tastes on the different areas of your tongue, mouth and throat, including the aftertaste. Don't forget to smell your cup after you've drunk all the tea liquor.
